A member of the Sisters of St. Clare from Ireland, Sister Briege is known worldwide for her ministry to priests and gift of healing. She traveled extensively with Vincentian Father Kevin Scallon to lead missions and clergy retreats in about 90 countries until his death in June 2018.

In a telephone interview from her offices in Tampa, Florida, Sister Briege said that her whole mission is to renew people's faith in what they believe.

Laypeople today "have a priestly ministry to mediate the Gospel of Jesus because we are baptized," she said. "In factories, in homes, wherever we work, it's not just because we're sent out in the sense of being a deacon or a catechist. We all have to do it."

After being healed of rheumatoid arthritis at age 24, Sister Briege received the ability to heal. She has seen many miracles occur, and intersperses her talks with life-changing testimonies, always magnifying Jesus and his sacraments.

"I tell the people Jesus lived, yes, 2,000 years ago, but he's alive today," Sister Briege said. "And for Catholics, if we knew that Jesus is really present and come to him in the sacraments, we would see miracles happen."
